Feedback Q 5 (Model answer)

A 5yo girl presents with a likely febrile convulsion which has terminated prior to arrival in ED.

List the 3 differences between a simple febrile convulsion and a complex febrile convulsion.

(6 marks)

Simple febrile convulsion	Complex febrile convulsion
Generalised tonic/clonic	focal features at onset or during
Last <15min	last >15min, prolonged
Does not occur within same febrile illness	Recurrent seizures within same febrile illness

Incomplete recovery at 1 hour

2. List 4 risk factors for recurrent seizures (4 marks)

- (i) The younger the child at the time of the initial convulsion, the greater the risk a further febrile convulsion (1 year old 50%; 2 years old 30%).
- (ii) Family history of seizures
- (iii) Presence of neurodevelopmental problems
- (iv) Atypical febrile convulsion either prolonged or focal
- (v) Previous febrile seizures
- (vi) Maximum 1 mark for combinations of Immune compromised, head injury, CNS infection, hypoglycaemia, hyponatraemia, prev epilepsy

3.List 3 discharge criteria/requirements (3 marks)

- (i) Return to normal neurological state
- (ii) Serious bacterial infection excluded or treated
- (iii) Parental education

Generally done well, but relatively easy question.

If it asks for 3 things, don't list 5 as the last 2 will not be marked.

If it asks for 3 separate points, writing 3 points per line (9 points in total) only first point on each line is marked.

If the examiner can't read your answer they can't mark it!
